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2021 NCHSAA BASKETBALL STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS

CHAPEL HILL - The North Carolina High School Athletic Association (NCHSAA) finalized and released the playoff brackets for the 2021 Basketball Championships. The tournament will have four classifications of play with five playoff rounds each. All classifications field 32 teams in the tournament.

Play began with games at the higher seed through the first four rounds. The schedule began with first round games on February 23, 2021. Second round was scheduled for February 25, the third round was slated for February 27, and the Regional Finals were held on Tuesday, March 3. The State Championship Games will be contested on Saturday, March 6 at Providence Grove and Wheatmore High Schools in Randolph County. Due to the Governor's Executive Orders limiting the size of mass gatherings, spectator attendance is limited for all rounds.

NFHS Network will carry all four championship matches this year. The Network also will have automated video streams of many early round contests from member schools equipped with the NFHS Network's Pixellot system. Schedules can be reviewed at their website. The NFHS Network is a subscription-based service. Fans can pay \$10.99 per month for a monthly, recurring subscription with the ability to cancel at any time. Spectator Limitations due to Executive Order

After revisions to the Executive Orders of Governor Roy Cooper, NCHSAA Board of Directors has approved the following spectator policy:

A maximum of 30% of the seated capacity of the gymnasium, with a cap of 250 spectators is permitted for the Regional Finals Round. The available number of tickets will be determined by host administration and 50% of available tickets must be made available to the visiting team for parents, families and fans.

A maximum of 15 cheerleaders, per school, will be allowed during all rounds of the playoffs. At the state championships, 12 spectators will be allowed for each participating team

Game Times

The default game time is 7:00 p.m. By mutual agreement, a game time of 6:00 p.m. is permissible without NCHSAA approval. Any game time earlier than 6:00 p.m. must be approved by the NCHSAA. Double-header game times are 6:00 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. respectively.

For round 3 games scheduled for Saturday, any mutually agreed upon match time does not require NCHSAA approval. However, on Saturdays, if teams cannot mutually agree, the higher seeded team may choose a starting time between 1:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. Should the visiting team have to travel more than 100 miles one way for the contest, the start time must be chosen between 1:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m.

The NCHSAA does permit schools to play earlier than the day listed for a given round, provided there is mutual agreement. Schools are responsible for updating their game time on brackets via MaxPreps.

Did you know?

When Wheatmore and Providence Grove High Schools host the 2021 Basketball state Championships it will be the first time since 1980 that NCHSAA Basketball State Championship Games have been contested on high school campuses since the Association played the State Championships in 1981 at the Greensboro Coliseum (Men's) and Elon College (Women's).

The last high schools to host State Championship Games for the NCHSAA were Garner (1A men's and women's), Union Pines (2A women), R.J. Reynolds (2A men), Hickory (3A women), Durham High (3A men) and Westover (4A women) all in the 1980 edition of the Championships.

COVID-19 Protocols for Participants

- Teams are still required to perform and complete the daily monitoring form
 - Visiting teams must complete their daily monitoring for all individuals in the travel party prior to boarding the bus and leaving for the contest
- To help minimize the spread of the COVID-19 virus during the playoffs, each team will be required to provide an attestation form that verifies each player, coach, and staff member is symptom-free and not currently under quarantine.
- The form may be found on the volleyball sports page of the NCHSAA website on Monday, January 11
 - Additionally, each team shall complete a travel party form that lists the names of team members, coaches, and staff on-site for each contest
 - The form may be found on the basketball sports page of the NCHSAA website on Monday, February 22.
- If there are any student-athletes on the team who have a Mandatory Mask Requirement Exemption Form, you must inform your opponent prior to the contest
 - All mask requirement exemption forms must be on hand for the contest and shared with the opposing team/officials

COVID-19 Protocols for Media

The NCHSAA's full COVID-19 guidelines and policies for media are available by visiting

Prior to working at an NCHSAA event, media members should check temperature and do a COVID-19 symptom check. If an individual's temperature is at or above 100 degrees, or if the individual has any symptoms of COVID-19 or reason to believe they may have been exposed to COVID-19, the individual should not attend any NCHSAA event or come to an NCHSAA member school's facility.

Some key items to be reminded of prior to attending: media space is limited; at no time should a media member enter the team bench area or locker room; Gameday administrators should provide a handout to media upon arrival that details policies and procedures relative to COVID-19 and social distancing.

MEMBERS OF THE MEDIA:

- Must submit to a COVID-19 screening upon arrival and as required by local policy.
- Must wear face coverings at all times, whether indoors or outdoors. Coverings must cover your mouth AND nose. The only exceptions to the requirement are for play-by-play or broadcast analysts providing live broadcasting where they can maintain social distancing from all other individuals present. Prior to the broadcast and upon completion of the broadcast, these individuals must also use face coverings.
- Must wash hands often, including after each visit to the restroom. Carry your own hand sanitizer.
- Must void personal contact with any individual on site (no handshaking, hugging, high fives, etc.)
- Must maintain six feet of social distance at all times.
- Must disinfect your equipment prior to arrival and after leaving the facility.
- Must inform the host athletic director in advance of their intent to cover the contest. Please ask at that time about specific guidelines in place at the district/school level.

Bracket Determination/Seeding Process

- 1) Automatic Bids: Conferences will be awarded a number of automatic qualifiers based on the number of teams within the conference that participated during the season. Conferences with 1-6 member schools fielding teams get 1 berth, 7-8 receive 2, and 9+ receive 3. These automatic berths are determined by the conference based on winning percentage within league play and any ties broken using the NCHSAA's approved tie-breaking procedure.
- 2) Wildcards will be selected in the East Region and West Region based on a team's conference winning percentage to populate 16 teams, including automatic berths, in each region and classification.
- 3) Once the 16 teams are determined in each region, the NCHSAA Staff will utilize the following draw procedure to set the final bracket:
 - a) Draws for the line placement of berths will occur in random order.
 - b) All #1 berths will be drawn first, followed by #2 berths, followed by any #3 berths and finally any wildcard berths.
 - c) Whenever possible, competition between conference opponents in the first round will be avoided. This may require the removal of a line placement draw possibility for a given team.

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CO-CHAMPIONS : THE STORY BEHIND THE 2020 BASKETBALL STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS

This week one year ago, hardly anyone in the high school sporting world was thinking about the Coronavirus, more specifically, COVID-19. Sure, it was something that we had all heard about on the news, specifically the outbreak in Wuhan, China. However, this novel virus, regardless of how dangerous it may be, was far from the forefront of our consciousness at the time.

The North Carolina High School Athletic Association has crowned State Champions in Men's Basketball every year since 1915. That year, in Chapel Hill's Bynum Gym, Winston-Salem beat Raleigh 21-13 to win the first NCHSAA Basketball State Championship. In each subsequent year, through wars, energy crises, depressions, and years of plenty the NCHSAA has managed to contest at least one State Championship Game in Men's Basketball, adding Women's Basketball State Championships in 1972 when North Pitt beat West Montgomery 58-34.

That all changed in 2020.

Coming off an exceptional Regional Finals weekend, the NCHSAA Staff was feverishly preparing to host another year of State Championship Games in the Dean E. Smith Center and Reynolds Coliseum. This hectic week for the Association staff is an annual tradition dating back to 1986 when the championships moved to the Smith Center and Carmichael Arena, with Reynolds Coliseum joining the mix in 2004.

To many on the Association staff, this week annually feels like our "Super Bowl." We are, after all, the home of some of the best high school basketball in the nation. Our State Championships have served as a big stage for some of the game's greatest players over

the years. Little kids growing up all across the Tar Heel State dream of suiting up and stepping onto the floor at the Smith Center or Reynolds Coliseum. These games are a big deal, not just for the Association and its member schools, but for communities all across the state.

Monday was simply a preparation day for the staff. Nothing seemed out of the ordinary in the office. Busy, but nothing unusual for the championship week. The copier frantically churned out copies of media notes, team notebooks and information packets for the Tuesday morning press conference and information session. Staff scrambled about packing up backdrops, Gatorade Coolers and game balls for the teams to distribute the next morning.

Tuesday morning is the start of the show. Press Conference and Information Session Day. The day all 16 teams converge on one site to go over last-minute information they need to know and run through the car wash of media interviews that await each Regional Champion Coach.

There is always a buzz around this event. This year is no different in that regard. Some coaches and athletic directors are nervous about the session, their minds pulled in a million different directions as they absorb the plethora of information and timelines, things they will need to know for Saturday to go off smoothly.

Some coaches and athletic directors are cool and calm, they have been here before, some frequently, and they are used to the messages, the hustle prior to a State Championship, the well-wishers, the interview requests, the hype. I would never think it becomes "old hat" to these coaches, but generally, it is pretty easy to pick out the veterans.

By 1:00 p.m. the Grand Ballroom at the Double-Tree by Hilton in RTP clears out completely. Coaches

are on their way back to their schools, scrambling to arrive in time for practice. Media have filed their stories and are driving back to the office, grabbing a bite to eat on the way while game-planning their preview stories and angles on the upcoming games of local interest.

The NCHSAA Staff almost always takes a deep breath when the Press Conference ends. Coming off of a weekend of 16 Regional Championships at four sites across the state and pushing straight into hard preparations for game operations and the press conference can be taxing. This year was no different. The mood in the office on Tuesday afternoon after the press conference is similar to an audible exhale. We have made it. The games are next.

No one in the office, maybe not even anyone in the state of North Carolina, could have predicted the events that would transpire over the next 48-72 hours.

Wednesday was a fairly typical morning in the Association offices. Well, as normal as ACC Tournament Week is in any sports-minded office across the Tar Heel State. Typically, during the ACC Tournament, many staff will take lunch breaks together, sitting in the Board room watching the games. They return to their offices and keep an eye on the games with tablets and TV Screens in their offices, while tying up loose ends to prepare for the State Championships and other upcoming sports.

These things all happen as usual. However, this year, there is conversation on the broadcasts about COVID-19, the staff has some discussions about it too. No one is really all that concerned, seemingly, expecting things to continue down the pre-ordained path towards a busy Championship Saturday.

Wednesday night as college basketball tournaments around the country go on, teams and leagues mull what may happen if COVID-19 gets into locker rooms and arenas? Will fans be allowed? Will teams be able to play?

Wednesday night, something else happens. The Utah Jazz and the Oklahoma City Thunder NBA game is being delayed for an unknown reason. The news came out soon enough. Rudy Gobert, a player for the Jazz, has tested positive. Game postponed. Within a very short period of time, NBA Commissioner Adam Silver and the

league announced they have suspended the season and will use the break in play to determine how to move forward.

Meanwhile, College Basketball Conference Tournaments across the country continue on, though nearly every one of those events is being overshadowed in the telecasts by discussions of the tremendous events taking place in Oklahoma City and the NBA offices. Some conferences stop their tournaments. Behind the scenes of the remaining conference tournaments, conference presidents and athletic directors are mulling their next steps. As university chancellors and presidents become involved, the impact to the NCHSAA State Championships begins to be felt.

On Wednesday night, the NCHSAA Sports Department staff is working late, sitting in Commissioner Que Tucker's office on the phone with University administrators at UNC and NC State, the host sites for the 2020 Championships. The NCHSAA Staff has just been informed that spectator and media attendance at the 2020 Basketball State Championships will be severely limited.

First it will be 100 fans and limited media. Then it is 35 per team. Team personnel and game administration like officials, scorer's table personnel, media and Association staff workers will be limited to 25 per venue. Tra Waters, Chiquana Dancy, and Commissioner Tucker work late into the night at 222 Finley Golf Course Road evaluating the feasibility of pulling off the staffing and plans on how to notify all of the teams and individuals involved in the Championships. Thursday comes.

As the daylight breaks at the Association offices, staff trudge into the building, many unaware of the late-night three of our co-workers spent at the office dealing with a major change in plans for Saturday. The Commissioner and Sports Department has just gotten off of a conference call with all participating schools in the State Championships. They've been informed of their limited number of tickets, told that information will be coming to them about how to access the facility, new information for the limited spectators that will be allowed to attend.

At 8:30, there is a staff meeting. The Commissioner informs the full staff of the changes to the plan

I headed to my desk to sit down and eat my sandwich. I pull out my iPad and flip on the ACC Tournament. Well ... it is supposed to be the ACC Tournament. There will be no tournament this year. Instead, it is the ACC Trophy Presentation in a nearly empty Greensboro Coliseum. Surreal. The Commissioner's door opens, and an email goes to the staff for a Staff meeting, immediately.

We all walk down to the Commissioner's office and that is when the news hits. There will be no NCHSAA Basketball State Championships this weekend. The Association has been told that there will be no large events on campus at UNC or NC State. Nowhere to play, means the games have to be postponed. Unfathomable just 48 hours ago.

As the next week rolls on, Governor Roy Cooper closes all schools across the state to in-person learning. Spring sports are placed on pause. People are hopeful that things will return to normal soon. The NCHSAA office closes to in-person work. March 17th is our last day in the office for March. We're hopeful to be back in the office in two or three weeks. Everyone is hopeful the Basketball Championships and spring sports will be played, too.

The days and weeks drug on, executive orders and closures of schools were extended. Office closures

NCHSAC Championship Results



The North Carolina High School Athletic Conference served for many years as the athletic organization for historically black high schools. The NCHSAC conducted championships in several sports, and Dr. W.T. "Army" Armstrong of Rocky Mount served as commissioner for many years.

The NCHSAA has spent quite a bit of time and effort trying to research state champions and other facts about the Conference, although what had been uncovered was sketchy. Recently, though, we acquired some documents which Tim Brayboy, who worked for the state Department of Public Instruction before his retirement, had discovered, and it sheds terrific light on the organization. The organization was fairly loosely knit in the 1920's and '30's, basically consisting of 30 to 35 black high schools with no well defined or consistent plan for declaring championships in any sport.

In 1946, a meeting was held in Charlotte to discuss reorganization. Dr. Armstrong was asked to draw up a constitution with rules and

regulations, suggest fees, and establish basic guidelines. There were 35 schools represented at that initial meeting. The organization actually used two different names during its time, including the North Carolina Negro High School Athletic Association and then the North Carolina High School Athletic Conference.

The conference's record membership was 215 high schools in 1959. That level stayed fairly consistent until the late 1960's, as integration began to take place. At its height, the Conference had approximately 90 football teams, 215 basketball teams, 75 in baseball, 30 in tennis and 40 in track.

In its last year of operation, in 1969, the NCHSAC was down to 48 schools, including 17 with football teams, all 48 with basketball, nine with baseball, four in tennis and five in track.

INDIAN HIGH SCHOOL TOURNAMENT



The Robeson Indian High School Athletic Conference began interscholastic participation in the 1920's. Original members of the conference were Fairmont, Green Grove, Magnolia, Pembroke, Piney Grove, Prospect and Union Chapel. Teams competed in several sports, but the post-season basketball tournament at Pembroke State was always a highlight of the year. With consolidation reducing the number of schools to four, the league added Hawkeye (Hoke County) and Les Maxwell (Cumberland in 1966 to become the Tri-County Indian High School Athletic Conference. Then in 1968 the schools joined the NCHSAA, just as the schools in the North Carolina High School Athletic Conference for black high schools did.
